Emory and Henry College	yes	lots are designated for commuters, residential students, and faculty/staff	\$100/year cars, \$50/year motorcycles
James Madison University	not freshmen		\$212/year
Longwood University	not freshmen	freshmen are permitted cars on an exception basis, then must use farthest lots	\$250/year, \$125/semester; less at Lancer Park; grad students \$100/year, \$50/semester
Norfolk State University	not freshmen	freshmen are permitted cars on an exception basis; lots are specially designated: fac/staff, commuter, general, reserved	\$75/year commuter/residential, \$150/year fac/staff, \$300/year reserved
Randolph College	yes	spaces are designated for commuters, residential students, and faculty/staff	\$50/year
Regent University	yes	all lots are general parking	\$100/year

Shenandoah University	yes	sell only as many parking permits as spaces, on a first-come basis	\$115/year
Sweet Briar College	yes	no restrictions	\$100/year
University of Mary Washington	not freshmen	all lots are general parking; freshmen are permitted cars on an exception basis (work off campus, riders, etc.)	\$250/year, except for lot for new facility \$500
Virginia Tech	yes	on-campus residents park in 2 specific areas during weekdays, parking is designated by group (faculty/staff, residential, graduate teaching asst, service vehicles, ride-share parking, etc.)	\$225/year for faculty/staff & on-campus residents, \$198 for commuter students, more classifications at http://www.facilities.vt.edu/tcs/parking/permits.asp
Virginia Wesleyan College	yes	all lots are general parking	\$50/year
